## 2.0 Environment Bill – Alan Jemmett and team from MEAS

- The Environment Bill presents a massive opportunity for the green environment going forward, often greener biodiversity type issues have been poorly resourced –
- Can't separate climate emergency and biodiversity emergency.
- Mark Dickens (CA) has asked MEAS to produce a briefing with regards to the Environment Bill and MEAS will consult, coordinate, and respond on behalf of city region. It is important that we amplify and coordinate our messaging – we do need to retain sufficient flexibility in the process to meet characteristics of the City Region. Draft will be circulated in the next few weeks – date will be given to comment and this will then be submitted.
- The Board were asked to comment and provided the following recommendations:
- a) The Nature Connected Board support being part of joint response – though they cannot ratify it until they have seen it.
- b) Each organisation within the collaboration has every right to express their views as they feel they need to.
- c) All representatives at the NC agreed that they wanted to be part of the response.
- d) The Board agreed that MEAS is a competent body to carry out this piece of work.
- e) That the Combined Authority coordinate the process, we would feed into it Local Nature Partnership will feed into strategy.

Bridging the gap to implementation.
